"CONVERSION Part 2: WHO DOES IT?"

Last month we learned that conversion is not merely outward changes,¹ but a true, spiritual change of the inward being, a turning of the heart and mind away from sin to God in Christ. This month we will consider who it is that does the work of converting a person from sin to Christ.

When it comes to the birth of a child, there is no doubt that it is the baby and not the mother who is born. At the same time, when it comes to the birth of a child, there is no doubt that it is the mother and not the baby who does the work (ask any mom!). Conversion is similar. It is absolutely the person that is converted to God, not God to the person. Yet, it is equally true that it is God who converts the person unto Him, not the person converting his or herself unto God. This is, no doubt, at least in part why Jesus uses the term being "born again" for conversion. For just as it is ridiculous to speak of babies birthing themselves, so it is equally absurd to speak of people converting themselves. So let us consider *why* this is the case.

To be blunt, it is because of people themselves, that is, the natural spiritual state of people. First of all, mankind is spiritually blind (1 Cor. 2:14). The natural person (that is, a person without faith and the Holy Spirit) has the law written on their heart (though blurred by sin) and a conscience to read it (Rom. 2:14-15). This allows a person to lead an externally decent life and, more, at least should let them know that there is something wrong between them and God.

However, there are two great limitations to this. First, since the law is blurred in their heart and, in addition, their conscience can err, a person never naturally understands the fullness of God's Law or their failure to keep it. That truth then naturally leads to the second point, the opinion that they can make things right with God by their own actions and changes. The idea that we are so bad that God's Son needed to die in our place simply does not compute, nor does the idea that such is given to us freely by simply trusting in that crucified and risen Son (1 Cor. 1:18,23). After all, "We're not *that* bad," and more, "We've got to do our part." Right? Wrong on both accounts! But the natural person *is blind to all this*.

Second, as if that wasn't bad enough, the natural person is spiritually dead in sin (Eph. 2:1). Not only are we too spiritually blind to rightly see our sins and our need for a Savior, we don't even have the power to believe in the first place. For dead people are fairly notorious for having no ability to do, well, anything! So it is that we are, spiritually speaking, walking corpses by nature. We are, of ourselves, completely unable to respond to God's love, His offer of full and free salvation in His Son, Jesus Christ. Just as it is true physically, so is it true spiritually that we are unable to raise ourselves out the state of death.

Third, and this really takes the cake, not only are we spiritually dead in sin, but by nature we are spiritually enemies of God (Rom. 5:10; 8:7,8) under the power of His enemy Satan (Eph. 2:2). We are not merely

spiritually walking corpses, but are like "spiritual undead," being actively hostile to God in our state of death. God says "Do" and human nature responds "No, I don't want to." God says "Don't do" and human nature responds, "Too bad, I want to do it." The more a person learns about the true God (in and through the Word), the more they don't like Him, hate Him, and the more obvious it becomes that they consider Him to be an enemy, as is made apparent by their many and varied attacks upon the God revealed in the Bible. Just consider statements like, "My God would never...!" or "A loving God would never...!" etc.

Spiritually blind, dead, and enemies of God, not a good combo to say the least. No wonder we cannot convert ourselves unto God, not even contribute to it in any way, but instead must *be* converted, that is, have God convert us. And this is taught clearly in Scripture. Not only does Jesus refer to conversion as a birth which indicates the work of another (mentioned above), but He states, "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him" (John 6:44). St. Paul writes, "No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' except in the Holy Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:3). And so faith in Christ is not a work of man's will (deciding for Jesus), but a gift (Eph. 2:8-9) that too is granted for Christ's sake (Phil. 1:29).

This teaching, that God alone is responsible for a sinner's conversion, is known as *divine monergism* (God works alone). Just as God created light where there was only darkness and just as Jesus needed to raise Lazarus from the dead, so also God alone creates the enlightenment of faith in a person, thereby raising them from spiritual death to spiritual life, converting them. And so we say, "If a person is saved, God alone receives the glory." Not just because God prepared salvation for us in Christ, but actually converts us unto Christ as well. *Next month, we will consider how God does His work of conversion in a person.*

APOLOGETICS: The LIES of LYNCHBURG HOW U.S. EVOLUTIONISTS TAUGHT the NAZIS.³

The chilling revelations of a recent [1993⁴] television documentary^a expose the disturbing consequences of evolutionary ways of thinking. Beginning in the 1920s, many thousands of people in the United States were sterilized against their will and without their consent, to prevent 'undesirable breeding'. Over 8,000 of these procedures took place at a major center to which such 'undesirables' were sent, in Lynchburg, Virginia.

The victims included some with various degrees of mental retardation; many were simply there because they had been abandoned as a result of broken homes or had suffered some other social misfortune. Some had been honors students at school. They were lied to routinely, being told that it was something 'for their own good' or 'for their health'. Those older ones who discovered the purpose behind the operations realized that they would not be able to leave the institution unless they underwent the procedure.

The documentary stated that the entire effort was based upon the notion of *eugenics*. The eugenics movement was started by Sir Francis Galton (a cousin of Charles Darwin), who wanted to encourage 'survival of the fittest' within human society. The 'humane' way to do this was by compulsory sterilization of those deemed 'unfit'. The idea seduced 'social reformers from the right and the left'—among them George Bernard Shaw, and Winston Churchill.

The Lynchburg doctor who was responsible for most of the sterilizations in his own town was convinced that what he was doing was for the 'scientific good' of society. As a dedicated Darwinian, notions of absolute right and wrong were old-fashioned obstacles to the greater good of the 'herd'. Needing a legal cover for his actions in the face of the human rights meant to be guaranteed in the (creation-based) U.S. Constitution, he became enamored with model legislation prepared by a leading U.S. evolutionary biologist, Dr Harry Laughlin.

Laughlin's law called for compulsory sterilization of not only the 'feeble-minded', but also the blind, drug addicts, sufferers from TB and syphilis, epileptics, paupers, the deaf and the homeless. Since these people were, it was claimed, obviously the victims of 'bad genes', the law was overtly aimed at maintaining the 'racial purity of the white race' by preventing the further 'breeding' of those whose offspring would 'drag down' this race.

What was needed was a test case, a 'patsy' to ensure that the law would not be declared unconstitutional. In a blatant set-up which made the ACLU's manipulation of the famous Scopes trial look positively mild, a young

lady was chosen who had been targeted for sterilization because there had allegedly been 'three generations of feeble-mindedness' in her family. Her lawyer challenged the Laughlin law all the way to the Supreme Court. However, far from being her champion, he was in reality one of those heavily involved in the formulation of these eugenics policies!

Unfortunately also for the young lady, the presiding judge of the Supreme Court hearing this case in 1924 was Oliver Wendell Holmes^d, an influential Darwinist^e who laid the legislative foundation for many of the advances of secular humanism in the United States. Not surprisingly, Holmes declared the law constitutional. It was acceptable for the state to compel the sterilization of those who were deemed 'socially inadequate'. The forced sterilization of this innocent victim went ahead; subsequent investigation has revealed that the entire story of the 'feeble-minded generations' in her family was a fabrication.

After the Supreme Court decision, eugenics became a major plank of social policy in many American states.

As soon as Hitler (who campaigned on a platform of naked evolutionism—the survival of the fittest race) came to power in 1933, eugenics laws became one of his first acts. Not only was the Nazi program of forced sterilization for the 'unfit' lauded in the U.S.—it was actually modelled after the law framed by Laughlin, who was awarded an honorary doctorate by Hitler's government. As the Nazis moved on to the euthanasia-murder of entire wards full of mental patients, 'scientific' admiration for their 'racial hygiene' policies was unabated. One U.S. evolutionist actually stated, 'The Germans are beating us at our own game'.^a

Once it was seen as 'moral' to take active steps to 'purify the German race', it was just a short, logical step from there to the even greater horrors of the Holocaust.^f

After World War II, the horrified reactions of a stunned U.S. public to the unimaginable atrocities done in the name of evolutionary 'racial hygiene' forced eugenics practices to go underground. The names of the practice changed, but it continued, right down past 1970. All in all, a grand total of some 70,000 people suffered involuntary sterilization.

It was the efforts of a Jenny Crockett, then with the ACLU (which, ironically, has a track record of mostly siding with evolutionary thinking) which brought this scandal to light, in the face of government attempts to keep the lid on. Eventually, a mumbled apology and some offer of 'mental health counselling' was all that was available for these many people whose lives had been destroyed by the assumptions of evolutionism.

The church overall must bear its share of the responsibility for being so 'bluffed' by the 'scientific' claims of evolutionists (which have since changed, and will keep on changing) that it failed to take a strong stand on the true history of man and the world. Instead, as now, it by and large preferred to either ignore the issue or maintain an uneasy compromise—or worse.^g The Lord Jesus said to believers: 'You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people's feet. You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden.' (Matthew 5:13–14).

We cannot just blame 'society' for the evils which flow naturally from the false root of evolutionism if we are unprepared to be salt and light, and to take a stand for biblical reality.

- b. Ironically, Laughlin in later life developed epilepsy himself, and was shunned by his evolutionary eugenicist colleagues as part of the very so-called 'white trash' he was trying to stop from breeding.
- c. The ACLU = the American Civil Liberties Union, usually a champion of left-wing, pro-humanist causes. In the famous Scopes 'monkey trial' of 1925, it deliberately sought to challenge a Tennessee law prohibiting the teaching of evolution by finding someone who would (falsely) confess to teaching it, relying on the ensuing publicity to win public sympathy for the evolutionary cause. - d. Oliver Wendell Holmes (1841–1935), a distinguished U.S. Supreme Court justice who approved compulsory sterilization. His evolution-based humanistic beliefs left an indelible stamp on America's laws, contributing greatly to today's relentless secularization.

It is now almost common knowledge among WWII historians that the machinery of mass extermination later used in concentration camps, including the notorious Zyklon-B gas, was actually developed by respected members of the German medical/psychiatric/biological establishment for such 'eugenic' purposes.
- g. Even the renowned defender of biblical inerrancy, the late <u>B.B. Warfield</u>, was at the same time a supporter of Darwinian evolution.

A LOOK at the LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS

Last month, in Article XXIII, The Marriage of Priests, we rightly confessed that priests (pastors) should be allowed to marry if they choose since marriage is God's gift to all mankind, and is the only God-pleasing outlet for sexual desires so that lust does not take control unless He has given the gift of chastity. This month we begin the article on the Mass, pointing out the errors of the papal church that had to be rejected.

Augsburg Confession Article XXIV: The Mass, 1-96

Our churches are falsely accused of abolishing the Mass. The Mass is held among us and celebrated with the highest reverence. Nearly all the usual ceremonies are also preserved, except that the parts sung in Latin are interspersed here and there with German hymns. These have been added to teach the people. For ceremonies are needed for this reason alone, that the uneducated be taught what they need to know about Christ. Not only has Paul commanded that a language understood by the people be used in church (1 Corinthians 14:2, 9), but human law has also commanded it. All those able to do so partake of the Sacrament together. This also increases the reverence and devotion of public worship. No one is admitted to the Sacrament without first being examined. The people are also advised about the dignity and use of the Sacrament, about how it brings great consolation to anxious consciences, so that they too may learn to believe God and to expect and ask from Him all that is good. Therefore, it does not appear that the Mass is more devoutly celebrated among our adversaries than among us. 12

⁷ The term *Mass*, still used in the Roman Church, refers here to both the ceremonies in the worship service surrounding Holy Communion (in the Divine Service what is called *The Service of the Sacrament*) and also the Sacrament itself. The two will be further distinguished throughout this article.

⁸ Note here the conservative nature of the Lutheran reformers, maintaining church traditions and ceremonies wherever possible unless they hindered the proclamation of the Gospel due to false teaching. Obviously, it was only a matter of time before the full service was brought into the vernacular.

⁹ Here the prime reason of ceremonies is given, that the people are taught by them. Other important reasons are the maintenance of order within the public worship service (1 Cor 14:26ff., esp. v. 40) and for the maintenance of appropriate reverence unto God.

¹⁰ Our older members may remember having to speak with the pastor before receiving Communion. Today, this has largely been replaced by the public Confession and Absolution. However, the care of souls has been hindered by the people no longer needing to speak with their shepherd.

¹² So we hold up the Sacrament in two ways. First, by using the ancient ceremonies we approach the Communion with reverence. Even more, we understand and use the Sacrament rightly according to Christ's institution and purpose, which glorifies God even as it strengthens our own faith.

- Easter Breakfast will follow in the Fellowship Hall.



CHRISTIAN LIVING





The most common question about stewardship is not whether a Christian should give to their church. Of course, Christians should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Rather, the question asked most is, "How much should I give?" But this question really means, "Should Chris-tians give a tenth of their income to their local congregation?"

Here are some common reasons against tithing. Some say tithing isn't necessary because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. There is no "Thus saith the Lord," or "should" concerning tithing. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give of their time and their talents, and these together with treasures (money) add up to

more than a tithe. Still others say that they give of their treasures to other things be-sides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church. And then there are those who think Christians shouldn't

tithe because of some fear. They are afraid that if they tithe, their gift will be misused, or that after tithing, there won't be enough left over to get the things that they use, want or need.

Here are some reasons why Christians should tithe. Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to. And on top of this, St. Paul often describes giving a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of one's income — terms similar to a tithe (2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? This tithe was intended to support the ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry. What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther used in the Small Catechism's Table of Duties to explain what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? After all, there is no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest verse we have, and it states simply that Christians should not neglect gathering together. And even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? The conversation might go something like this. I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life and salvation, and to receive His gifts in Word and Sacrament. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it.

We should approach the topic of tithing with a similar conversation. The tithe is not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, we're ecstatic that you're giving, and that you're giving in all these various ways — time, talents and treasures. But there is a better way. And that will only be a blessing to you, just as the Word of God — Old and New Testament alike — promises. Can you try increasing your gifts over the coming weeks, months and years? Can you put your trust in the God who sent His Son to take away your sin and give you everlasting life? And if He did this for you, if He did not spare His only Son, how will He not give you all things? He will not disappoint.


PRAYER REQUESTS

"Speaking the truth in love" (Eph. 4:15) is always a necessity. Just as our brains need to receive true inputs from all our senses in order to tell the body to respond to the world properly, so all the members of the Church, the body of Christ, need to speak the truth to one another, so that we all have the correct information to respond to one another in love. And the people of the world need us to speak the truth to them, because they are hearing many untruths from scammers, advertisers, the media, government leaders, and unfaithful religious leaders. We need to speak the truth "in love," because we do not want to use the truth as a weapon against anyone except the

devil and his allies. "We do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly realms" (Eph. 6:12). So we use the strongest weapon against Satan that we know: "the sword of the Spirit, which is God's word" (Eph. 6:17). God's "word is truth" (John 17:17). 


