And I will judge between sheep and sheep. ²³And I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. ²⁴And I, the Lord, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them. I am the Lord; I have spoken."



31 [Jesus said:] "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. 32Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. 33 And he will place the sheep on his right, but the goats on the left. 34Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. 35For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, 36I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' 37Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? 38 And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? 39 And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' 40 And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'

LOVE! The world often makes love all about how we "feel" towards another, but this emotion can easily come and go which is why we hear people speaking of "falling in or out of love.".

God's love is different. It is an action. It is a act of will not always coming from good feelings. It is a choice to act in love even when the other does not deserve it.

We first learn something about love within our families. A couple quickly comes to recognize the differences be-

tween them and the annoying actions (or inactions) of their spouse. Will they nurse their frustrations, covet what others (seem to) have and so finally choose adultery, desertion, divorce? Or will they choose to love their spouse by choosing to love, to stay in the marriage, forgiving as God has forgiven them, focusing less on the other's faults and more on their good qualities, and seeking constructive ways to work though the issues?

If God grants the blessing of children, will they be taught gentleness, kindness and compassion? Will they see their parents working together even in difficult circumstances? Will they experience forgiveness, patience, loving discipline, and encouragement when they do wrong?

It is within these primary relationships that we learn the most about love, hopefully including God's love. Families are the classroom for teaching and learning what love is and how we are called to love others. Last Sunday of the Church Year November 26, 2023

Text: Matthew 25:1-13 (Gospel Reading)

Other Texts: Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24 (Old Testament Reading); 1 Corinthians 15:20-28 (Epistle)

"Truths About Sheep and Goats"

Grace, mercy, and peace to you from God our Father, and our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen!

Today we celebrate the Last Sunday of the Church Year, which in some Christian traditions is known as Christ the King Sunday. Whether we give it a special title or not, ii the focus continues the theme of the last few Sundays: the visible return of Christ Jesus in His heavenly glory, the bodily resurrection of all people (which includes the changing of the bodies of those who are still alive on the Last Dayiii), the end of this creation, the final judgment of the living and the dead, and the entrance of all people, body and soul, into eternity as determined by the King's righteous judgment. So let us meditate upon what our Lord says in today's Gospel.

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. And he will place the sheep on his right, but the goats on the left."

Right after the risen Jesus ascended into heaven, the angels said to the gawking disciples, "This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." Today's text refers to His return. It is *the* Day, the day of reckoning, the day of judgment, the Lord's Day. It is when He fully consummates all His promises, both to save His elect children as well as to execute His vengeance upon His enemies. The specific date of His return is unknown and unknowable. But it is certain, inevitable, and every day it is one day closer, as indicated by the many signs of its increasing nearness become increasingly obvious.

On this day, at the King's command, His army of holy angels shall gather "all the nations" before Him. Vi So it is clear that no one, neither a people group nor any individual, will escape judgment. Just as He came the first time to be the Savior of all people, so He will come the second time to be the Judge of all people. And the judgment is not some long, drawn out process. The angels bring mankind before the King and by divine omniscience and omnipotence the Lord Christ immediately separates them to either His left or His right. And it is beyond any question that there are only two groups of people. Before the throne of the King there are no social, ethnic, or cultural distinctions. There is no preference for either the rich or the poor. There is no third, neutral, group. One is either a goat who cannot escape the King, though that is their every desire, or a sheep who has absolutely no desire at all to escape from their saving King.

Jesus speaks to all, first to those on His right, then to the ones on His left. But because He uses acts of mercy, works either done or not done to the least of His brethren, to show the justice of His judgment, we will consider this closer as there are many false explanations of His words.

The first thing is the teaching that Jesus' brothers are needy people in general and that those who help them are thereby the sheep for they served Jesus and those who didn't help them are the

goats who failed to serve Jesus. Now Scripture, both testaments, does teach that we are to help those in need; after all, we are to love even our enemies! But this understanding of Jesus' words cannot stand based upon Scripture as a whole, or even this text.

Why? To begin, it absolutely contradicts the most important teachings of Scripture. First, the Law of God which says no one is righteous by their own works, nor could they ever be saved by them. VII Second, it denies the very Gospel itself; that condemned sinners are saved not by their works, but are declared righteous by faith in *the completed work of Christ*, His life, death and resurrection as our substitute under God's Law. VIII

Of course works of love are to be done, but they can only follow the most important thing, which is faith in the Son whom the Father has sent.^{ix} Of course, faith is to be active in love, is to bear fruit loving the neighbor as oneself, and without such is dead,^x but works without faith in Christ crucified and risen as Savior do not count as without faith it is impossible to please God.^{xi} Thus being "a good person" *cannot* save anyone since, as Jesus said, God alone is good, so only those who receive His righteousness through faith in Christ are good in His eyes.^{xii}

That settles the issue, but it is still important to know who Jesus' brothers are. And nowhere in Scripture does Jesus identify Himself with the poor and needy in general, declaring them His brothers or true family. On the contrary, Jesus actually declares who they are saying, "For whoever does the will of my Father in heaven is my brother and sister and mother." And since we just heard that to do the will of the Father means, first and foremost, to have faith in Jesus, it becomes clear that those to whom Jesus refers as His brothers have to be *Christians*, those who do the Father's will by confessing Jesus as God, Lord, and Savior. So St. Paul's exhortation is not surprising, "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, *and especially to those who are of the household of faith*." The apostle simply repeats his Lord who called him!

A final biblical teaching against the belief that those who do good things to the needy are automatically the sheep is that numerous other parts of the Bible mention other things as necessary, so we must not take the list here as all inclusive. For faith first of all includes turning from sin, as the idea that the evil I commit is counteracted by the good I do is nothing less than absolute paganism and has no place amongst Christians. One cannot willingly continue in sin and somehow still be saved by doing some good things! More, the list of the fruit of the Spirit and our callings in our various vocations include much more than just these few acts of love that Jesus mentions. Consequently, for all these reasons it is obvious that one is a sheep through repentance and faith in Christ, which are shown to be genuine by good works, and not by any works without faith since such people cannot do a single good work and so are the goats.

Another point to consider is that it is sometimes stated that the believers were completely surprised that they had any good works and this is then used to prove that we should not think about doing good works since they will just automatically come. Of course, if we are doing good works only for a reward we are not Christians, but mercenaries! It is to such people that Jesus rightly warns that whatever thanks they get here on earth is the only reward they will get, for they "will have no reward from [their] Father who is in heaven." And it is true that they did not have a list of their works ready to whip out and remind the King with.

But what surprised them was not so much that they had done works, but Jesus saying that *He* was the recipient of them. So far from, "Don't think about doing good works," Jesus' mysterious, yet lovely words, "as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me"xvi actually encourages us to do works of love and mercy towards our fellow believers.

"Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world... Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels."xvii

Hear how Jesus puts heaven and hell as well as their eternal nature in parallel. This destroys any idea that only heaven exists, or that heaven lasts forever but hell doesn't. Such might sound nice, but so do all of Satan's lies, *every one of which leads us away from Christ*!

Those on the right are blessed by Jesus' Father for they are the elect, receiving from His Holy Spirit every good gift by which they became and remained His children, the Word and Sacraments, contrition, faith, repentance, forgiveness of sins, new life, perseverance in saving faith unto the end. Now these children, spiritually speaking, come of age, inheriting the kingdom prepared for them before the creation first came into existence, fully enjoying the visible manifestation of their being kings and priests unto God. They hear the invitation, "Come," and so enter the blessedness of the life of the world to come, children coming to their Father's home.

But those on the left do not hear "Come," but "Be gone!" They are not cursed by the Father, for it is they who despised His Word, resisted His Spirit's working, and so, ultimately, rejected Jesus and His salvation. Perhaps they did such their whole life, perhaps they were believers who later fell away. Either way, they are cast into the eternal fire that was prepared, not for them, but for the devil and his angels. But since they are not children of the Heavenly Father, but have shown themselves to be children of the devil, they too go to their "father's home."

When Jesus returns in glory, He will separate the sheep, that is, true Christians whose names are in the Lamb's book of life, xviii from the hypocrites, false Christians, outwardly noble unbelievers, openly vile sinners and every other goat as well. Believers will be vindicated, unbelievers will be condemned. The books recording the works will then be opened. xix

To believers, who have no sins since they have been washed away in Christ's precious blood, degrees of glory will be awarded based upon their faithfulness to Christ's Word, the good works they did, especially towards their fellow believers, forgiving as they have been forgiven, the suffering they patiently endured, the crosses they bore for His sake. So also, to unbelievers who have no good works but only sins, degrees of torment will be decided based upon whether they heard the Word and rejected it, were believers who fell away, and what sins they committed, what harm they caused, especially lack of love towards, and persecution of believers.

Dear Christians, this Day will come; it is even now coming. So even as we trust in being God's sheep through grace, may we strive to live as His people so that we do not lose His grace, but instead glorify it by our lives bringing honor to our Triune God. May He make it so. Amen!
