From the Pastor

"Freed by Christ to be Little Christ's to Others"

As our country celebrates Independence Day, we rightly offer thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for the blessing of our nation and the many freedoms that we enjoy. Truly, the Bill of Rights was both novel in its time and remains one-of-a-kind. And we Christians should be even more thankful to God for especially the First Amendment:

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

See that the very first freedom mentioned, even before speech, press and peaceable assembly, is *the free exercise of religion*! And the word "exercise" is critical, as this is not merely the freedom "to believe in your heart whatever you want." Though that is true, far more it is the freedom "to live your life according to what you believe." No wonder then that in this time when religious people in general, and often Christians in particular, are being told to "sit down and shut up" and "to keep your beliefs out of civil life," true and faithful citizens of every stripe recognize this as an attack on the most fundamental freedom the Constitution protects. May God in His undeserved mercy continue to protect our religious freedom and, that He would not deprive us of it because of lack of care, may He continue to work in us a true desire *to exercise* our Christian religion in our varied vocations in home, school, work, and community!

Speaking of this, it is important and helpful to realize that all aspects of our lives are to be the "exercise of religion." As believers, we enjoy the glorious liberty of the children of God. It is none other than Jesus' Himself who speaks of our freedom, "If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free... So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." Just consider, we have freedom from sin, both its guilt and its ruling power. We have freedom from the Law, certainly the traditions of men, but even the Holy Law's accusations and driving. We have freedom from death and hell: since eternal life in heaven is ours we too cry out "O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?" 2

This is joyful indeed as our fear is removed and we've been freed to live as whom we were created to be! However, since we still have the sinful nature clinging to us, dragging us down, as well as the wicked and immoral world and the lying devil, we are easily tempted to abuse our Christian freedom. Instead of seeing it as a liberty from sin, we are tempted to see it as a license to sin. "Jesus and I have a great gig going; He likes to forgive which is cool since I like to sin." It should be obvious that Christ did not bleed and die so that we could continue in our sins!

But Christian freedom is still more than being freed from sin and Satan's rule in our lives. It is being freed to love others, to willingly serve them even as our dear Lord willingly humbled Himself and served us even unto death on the cross. This means that though we are fully free children of God *through faith in Christ, in Christian love* we who are dutiful slaves of God and servants to one another.

- Let no one seek his own good, but the good of his neighbor. (1 Corinthians 10:24)
- Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. (Romans 13:8-10)
- Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. (1 Corinthians 13:4-7)
- So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith. (Galatians 6:10)

And so we never use our freedom selfishly, but for the benefit of others. And since we live our Christians freedom everyday of our lives, even the exercise of the privileges and responsibilities of being a U.S. citizen is to be done in love. This means even voting is not done selfishly, "Who will make sure my retirement is best?" or such, but it too is a means by which we serve our neighbor.

So as we vote, we think of protecting the lives of the unborn from being murdered. Again, we think of upholding God's created order of male and female and His institution of marriage between one man and one woman until death parts them, not only because it's God's will, but because such benefits people who live rightly in them, the individuals, the couples, the children, and therefore, broader society. Once more, we think of the government's purpose of upholding law and order for that provides safety to our neighbors' body and property. Even in those places where God's Word does not give much specific direction, where we may well disagree on specific ways of enacting good, we never forget that it has always been the calling of God's people to look out for the wellbeing of the widow, the orphan, the poor, the alien, and others who are disadvantaged. There's no place for selfishness in a Christian as we are to be "little Christ's" to others.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we live in this world, but are not of it. We never see ourselves as doing something fully secular (i.e. not religious), because God is the Creator of all, so everything is under Him. So let us consider: St. Paul wrote, "So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God." Now if eating and drinking are to be done to God's glory, *how much more than* is carrying out our civil duties in God's kingdom of the left, using our Christian liberty rightly to serve God by serving the neighbor in love, and not the self.

APOLOGETICS: JONAH'S WORM⁵

The biblical account of Jonah gives us wonderful examples of God's mercy. First, mercy is given to a recalcitrant prophet, and then to the undeserving nation of Nineveh.

Jonah had to learn obedience the hard way. The account tells us that Jonah was called to preach to Nineveh, but instead he decided to flee across the ocean to a distant land.

However, God's calling could not be evaded. Events led to Jonah being thrown overboard, where he was swallowed by a great fish prepared by God. His life was spared, and he then went to Nineveh to preach. Jonah was disappointed that the people repented, and so God showed Jonah his further wrong attitude through the object lesson of a plant and a 'worm':

Now the Lord God appointed a plant [qiqayon], and made it come up over Jonah, that it might be a shade over his head, to save him from his discomfort. So Jonah was exceedingly glad because of the plant. But when dawn came up the next day, God appointed a worm [tola] that attacked the plant, so that it withered (Jonah 4:6–7).

Over the years scholars have tried to identify the plant and worm. While a good candidate for Jonah's plant has been proposed, the identity of the worm has proved elusive. Now, after more than 2,500 years, it seems scientists may have discovered this.

Jonah's plant

The Hebrew word *qiqayon* for the plant has been variously rendered as *vine*, *ivy*, or *gourd* in English translations. None of these is accurate. But there is now general agreement that *qiqayon* refers to the castor oil plant, *Ricinus communis*, which gains support from Church and Hebrew tradition.^a In AD 404, the Church Father Jerome suggested the plant was then known to the Syriac people. It was fast-growing and could stand without support, being neither a gourd nor ivy.^b

The identification of Jonah's 'vine' as the castor oil plant *Ricinus* is of interest to Bible scholars and entomologists because it is highly toxic. The leaves and seeds are poisonous, and the leaf extract makes a potent insecticide—therefore very few insects can feed on the plant. It is also toxic to people and animals, and ricin has even been used as a chemical weapon! (But castor *oil*, made from the seeds, is safe. First, because ricin hardly dissolves in oil, and more importantly, the oil is heated to 80 °C (176 °F) which denatures ricin.) So, how could a worm (*tola*) feed on Jonah's plant if it is so poisonous?

'New' moth species described in Israel

Despite this toxicity, in recent years a beautiful species of tiger moth has been discovered in Israel, which in its caterpillar stage can feed upon *Ricinus* without harm. The moth was at first thought to be new to science and described under the name *Olepa schleini*.^c However, it has since been found to be the same species as *Olepa ricini*, which is known in Bangladesh, China, India, Nepal, Sri Lanka, and Thailand.^d The caterpillars can cope with the toxins because they have very high activity of a detoxifying enzyme called *glutathione S-transferase* (GST).^e

The habits of the caterpillars of *O. ricini* match the account given in the book of Jonah. They normally feed at night, and they can quickly destroy a *Ricinus* plant. (They also feed on useful plants such as cotton, maize, sweet potato, and banana.) The caterpillars usually leave the plant before sunrise, and hide from the heat among dry leaves nearby.

Supernatural supplementing the natural

<u>Jonah 4:10</u> says that the plant "came into being in a night and perished in a night". Supernatural action is obviously involved with several aspects of the Jonah account, but in such a way that much of it still happens 'naturally':

- Jonah could not naturally survive unharmed for three days inside the belly of any ocean creature. But it may well be natural for one of the marine monsters in creation's catalogue to swallow such a mammalian morsel.
- A *Ricinus* plant would not normally reach a size large enough to shade a man within a night—but it is rather fast-growing. Similarly:
- The plant may well have succumbed faster than usual—but the natural destruction this caterpillar wreaks can be very rapid (fig. 3). And its attacks do take place at night, as the verse suggests.

It may appear surprising that an insect so destructive to *Ricinus* should have gone undocumented in the Middle East for so long, but the insect appears to be quite scarce there. While there are fears it may be on the verge of extinction, it has managed to survive for 2,500 years without anyone reporting on its behavior. f

Summary and conclusion

This caterpillar's feeding behaviour on *Ricinus* and its occurrence in the Middle East make it an extremely likely candidate for Jonah's 'worm'. Bible believers should not be surprised that the text of Scripture once again correlates with an aspect of observational science.

A LOOK at the LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS

Last month, we completed our reading Article XXVII, Monastic Vows, declaring the Scriptural truth that Christian perfection is found through faith in Christ and then living according to God's commandments in whatever calling He has placed us, not by taking special vows that God has not commanded, especially those that are taken to earn God's favor or merit His grace and forgiveness. This month we begin looking at Article XXVIII, Church Authority, confessing the Scriptural truth that the authority of bishops, that is, pastors, is preaching and teaching the Word of God, forgiving and withholding forgiveness of sins, and administering the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

Augsburg Confession Article XXVIII: Church Authority, 1-116

There has been great controversy about the power of the bishops, in which some have terribly confused the power of the Church with the power of the State. This confusion has produced great war and riot. All the while the popes, claiming the Power of the Keys, have instituted new services and burdened consciences with Church discipline and excommunication. But they have also tried to transfer the kingdoms of this world to the Church by taking the Empire away from the emperor. Learned and godly people have condemned these errors in the Church for a long time. Therefore, our teachers, in order to comfort people's consciences, were constrained to show the difference between the authority of the Church and the authority of the State. They taught that both of them are to be held in reverence and honor, as God's chief blessings on earth, because they have God's command.

Our teachers' position is this: the authority of the Keys [Matthew 16:19], or the authority of the bishops—according to the Gospel—is a power or commandment of God, to preach the Gospel, to forgive and retain sins, and to administer Sacraments. Christ sends out His apostles with the command, "As the Father has sent Me, even so I am sending you...Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of anyone, they are forgiven; if you withhold forgiveness from anyone, it is withheld" (John 20:21-22). And in Mark 16:15, Christ says, "Go...proclaim the Gospel to the whole creation."

This authority is exercised only by teaching or preaching the Gospel and administering the Sacraments, either to many or to individuals, according to their calling. In this way are given not only bodily, but also eternal things: eternal righteousness, the Holy Spirit, eternal life. These things cannot reach us except by the ministry of the Word and the Sacraments, as Paul says, "The Gospel...is the power of God for salvation to everyone that believes" (Romans 1:16). Therefore, the Church has the authority to grant eternal things and exercises this authority only by the ministry of the Word. So it does not interfere with civil government anymore than the art of singing interferes with civil government. For civil government deals with other things than the Gospel does. Civil rulers do not defend minds, but bodies and bodily things against obvious injuries. They restrain people with the sword and physical punishment in order to preserve civil justice and peace [Romans 13:1-7].

The Rewards of Godliness

It's no secret that you can't bribe your way into heaven. No amount of good works will impress God enough to open heaven's door for their sake. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23) and the person who "keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become guilty of all of it" (James 2:10). Rather, salvation is "the free gift of God ... in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:23).

So, your good works won't earn you the reward of heaven. But does that mean that there are no rewards at all? Consider what the Small Catechism says in the "Close of the Commandments":

What does God say about all these commandments?

He says, "I, the LORD your God, am a jealous God, punishing the children for the sin of the fathers to the third and fourth generation of those who hate Me, but showing love to a thousand generations of those who love Me and keep My commandments." (Ex. 20:5–6)

What does this mean?

God threatens to punish all who break these commandments. Therefore, we should fear His wrath and not do anything against them. But He promises grace and every blessing to all who keep these commandments. Therefore, we should also love and trust in Him and gladly do what He commands. (SC II)

God promises to bless you in keeping His commandments. What might these blessings be? Well, consider what Paul says about keeping the Fourth Commandment: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 'Honor your father and mother' (this is the first commandment with a promise), 'that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land'" (Eph. 6:1–3).

And think about what your life would be like if you went around stealing (breaking the Seventh Commandment), telling lies about people (breaking the Eighth Commandment), and generally being cruel to those around you (breaking all the commandments!). That is obviously not a blessed way to live. In fact, you'd be miserable living that way.

And Jesus says more about what is in store for those who make sacrifices for His sake: "Jesus said to them, 'Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on His glorious throne, you who have followed Me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or

brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for My name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life" (Matt. 19:28–29).

So don't grow impatient in doing good. Follow the Lord who has freely given you everlasting life.



Well-conceived projects will be considered in the following order of priority: first, brand-new church plants; second, mission-focused augmentations to existing ministries (e.g., adding a new ethnic ministry to a present congregation); third, established CID missions (e.g., Ministry in Spanish, Campus Ministry, Deaf Ministry, Prison Ministry). Rev. Burdick provided an evangelism-themed devotion from Mark 5

- Rev. David Dunlop gave his Mission Presentation on prison ministry at Logan Correctional Center in Lincoln, IL. He spoke personally of the despair and loneliness that inmates face. Rev. Dunlop wants to be a "broken record" of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, repeating the Gospel all the time. Rev. Dunlop is thankful for CID's support of the prison ministry, saying, "When I go to the prison, everyone in CID is going with me."
- Rev. Mohr gave his president's report with gratitude for congregations having received candidates from both seminaries to fill a portion of the vacancies in CID.

- The 2025 CID Convention is scheduled for July 13-15 at Crown Plaza, Springfield. Planning is underway.
- President Mohr is also planning a joint meeting with the Board of Directors and Circuit Visitors when Synod officials visit CID in September.
- <u>Church Extension Fund actively supports our congregations and CID members with loans, investments, and grants.</u> In April, CEF approved two Ministry Outreach Grant requests to help with Evangelism efforts.
- Dr. Schurb displayed statistical maps showing CID potential by county for New Church Starts.
- It was noted that only 1/6th of CID congregations have participated in Dollars for Missions. Consider discussing this and your congregation's Mission Offerings to CID, to continue to support all the ongoing work of the LCMS in our district.
