The Nativity of Our Lord—Christmas Day (Dawn)

December 25, 2023

Text: Luke 2:1-20 (Gospel Reading)

Other Texts: Isaiah 62:10-12 (Old Testament Reading); Titus 3:4-7 (Epistle Reading)

"The Answer: The Christ Child"

Grace, mercy and peace be unto you from God our Father and His Eternal Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, who was born of the Virgin Mary in Bethlehem to save us from our sins.

Christmas has had its "bad guys." Ebenezer Scrooge, from Charles Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," is a selfish, cold-hearted miser who despises Christmas because it is a time of unnecessary expense and frivolity, both of which interfere with his priorities of wealth and profit. Then there's Dr. Seuss's Grinch. While his full reasons are unknown, he's bitter and mean, bothered by others being happy, hating all the noise which comes from the Who's enjoying Christmas. Yet in both cases, by the end of the story both have come around, finding joy in Christmas as they embrace the spirit of generosity and compassion.

But now a new bad guy of Christmas is around, Krampus. To be fair, he has been around for centuries as a part of some European groups' folklore. He's kind of the bad cop to St. Nicholas's good cop. While St. Nick gave gifts to the good boys and girls, Krampus would dish out the punishment to the bad kids with birch rods. But according to a recent article in the Washington Post, Krampus is becoming increasingly popular in the United States now days.

Now why is it that this hairy, horned goat-like monster, with spindly, sharp fingernails and a long, creepy, tongue is gaining popularity in our culture? Apparently, more people, especially young ones, are looking for a counterbalance to all the holly jolly. To them reality is all negative: climate doom, ongoing war and violence, political turmoil, social injustice and unrest. All the institutions, whether church, government, even the nuclear family, are perceived as outdated, corrupt, and oppressive. So the foundations that provided social order and gave a sense of self and purpose are fading away, or being forcibly removed, leaving them wandering aimlessly, or finding purpose and meaning only in further attacking that which once provided purpose and meaning.

So as the Holiday stuff appears increasingly frivolous and empty to these people, so also Krampus just feels more authentic than Santa Clause. Especially since, unlike Scrooge or even the Grinch, Krampus doesn't get sucked back in, but stays bitter and jaded.

Interestingly, while the Gospel account of Christ's birth has been romanticized in some ways, such as with an ox and ass keeping time for a little drummer boy, the actual account recorded by St. Luke is anything but a happy story full of empty frivolity. It's not even a story of someone learning to let go of their selfishness and greed and embrace a spirit of generosity and compassion. Actually, it's rather plain in its features and more, imbedded in unpleasant reality.

Just consider the situation. The ruler in faraway conquering and oppressive Rome wants to take a census to get more tax money and poor Joseph can only comply. Living in Nazareth he now

needs to make an 80-some mile journey to Bethlehem on foot. Right from the get-go this was difficult as it required him to close up his shop, putting work and income on hold. How that money would have been handy with a baby on the way. Oh yeah, the baby! The trip would be even more difficult with Mary being in the late stages of her pregnancy.

While we don't know about the trip proper, whether things went well or were following Murphy's Law, we certainly do hope that their arrival in Bethlehem was not an indicator of the rest of their journey. With no room in the inn, no other place to stay, finally they find shelter, a place where some animals had been corralled for the night. It wasn't the cleanest place, but it was something. And something was desperately needed as soon Mary began labor.

No wonderful nursery with all the special touches here, not even for that time period. Mary in labor pains, her water breaking, Joseph lying down blankets and cloaks, whatever he could to make her as comfortable as possible in such a terrible situation. Perhaps he took a blanket and started tearing it up to make the strips of cloth. Did he empty out the manger, cleaning it as best he could so that it could be used as a cradle? No silly, empty, frivolity here? Just the harsh reality of living in the real world with its many difficulties and stresses.

Yet, we also see here the powerful truth that the Divine Majesty works in and through this harsh reality. But should this surprise us? For the first thing we should remember is that *He's the One who made it harsh*. He cursed the creation due to mankind's sin. He gave the holy judgment of death, and all that leads to it, upon sinners.

Which makes what happened in Bethlehem all the more incredible as the spirit of generosity and compassion goes far beyond what could ever be imagined. For though holiness hates sin and righteousness demands judgment, the Father gives the greatest gift imaginable, His Son to be our Savior, conceived by a true spirit of generosity, the Holy Spirit Himself.

Yes, there is great joy here, but it is anything but frivolous. As Isaiah foretold, God's people are called The Holy People and the Redeemed of the Lord as the Christ Child will make them holy by redeeming them by His sacrifice which pays for their sins. While it is easy to feel alone and abandoned in this world, God assures us that we are called Sought Out, A City Not Forsaken, for He has given us His Son to be our Good Shepherd who has sought us, who promises that He will never forsake us, but will be with us always to the very end of the age. ¹

Just imagine the scene, and then see God's works. Mary and Joseph holding a little baby in their arms. The baby who is the only-begotten Son of God, the eternal Word by whom all things were made. Joseph cutting Jesus' umbilical cord, who will cut the cords of sin and death, the chains of Satan's rule that entangle him and us. Joseph washing the newborn child, who would wash away his sin, and yours and mine as well. Mary wrapping her little baby boy in those strips of cloth, who would wrap her and us in the perfect white robe of His righteousness. Mary and Joseph placing the baby Jesus in the manger to rest. The baby who, after His death and resurrection, will ascend to heaven to prepare a place for them and all believers in heaven.

People are drawn to Krampus, or at least what he symbolizes to them, because there is no real understanding of personal sin and debt before the Holy God, yet their emptiness remains because

they are shackled to sin and Satan and doomed to die. So they despise the holly jolly, but then spiral into deeper depression, despair, and darkness even as they light torches to burn down all that they consider stopping utopia from happening. Their condemnation is just. But it is also sad. For they need not be judged. They need not be lost in a darkness that sees Krampus as the answer; for the devil is never the answer, but ever and only the problem.

But neither is the answer holly jolly. A surface level emotional high that, like a drug, gives a false high as is shown by the post-season blues (and sometimes even during the season). Nor is the answer developing a spirit of compassion and generosity. While these are valuable here on earth, without the proper source even these qualities will leave one empty, already in this life, but certainly in the next since the judgment cuts much deeper. That is why St. Paul wrote to Titus that we need the baptismal washing of regeneration and renewal, which changes us from the inside out, as holy virtues flow from holy faith in the Holy Child.

Dear Christians, the answer is neither negativity nor empty joy; it is not even in becoming a better, kinder person. The answer is that which was announced by the heavenly messenger,

"Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a manger."²

God fill you with deep joy and the peace that surpasses all understanding as you receive His gift of His Son as your Savior, the forgiveness of sins He has won for you, the new life His Spirit gives to you, and the certain hope of that life lasting forever in the glorious world to come. Amen!
