

Christian Questions with Their Answers Prepared by Dr. Martin Luther for those who intend to go to the Sacrament*

After confession and instruction in the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, and the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper, the pastor may ask, or Christians may ask themselves these questions:

7. Who is Christ?

The Son of God, true God and true man.

8. How many Gods are there?

Only one, but there are three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

9. What has Christ done for you that you trust in Him? He died for me and shed His blood for me on the cross for the forgiveness of sins.

10. Did the Father also die for you?

He did not. The Father is God only, as is the Holy Spirit; but the Son is both true God and true man. He died for me and shed His blood for me.

11. How do you know this?

From the holy Gospel, from the words instituting the Sacrament, and by His body and blood given me as a pledge in the Sacrament.

12. What are the words of institution?

Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to the disciples and said: "Take eat; this is My body, which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me." In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them saying: "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

Third Sunday of Easter April 14, 2024

Text: Acts 3:11-21 (First Reading)

Other Texts: 1 John 3:1-7 (Epistle); Luke 24:36-49 (Gospel Reading)

"Terrible Sin, Incredible Forgiveness"

"Christ is risen! [He is risen indeed!] Alleluia!" Our text is the First Reading from the book of Acts. Right before today's text, Peter and John had gone up to the temple at the time of the evening sacrifice, which was a time of prayer as well. Here we see an example of these two apostles doing what St. Paul described in 1st Corinthians, "To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews." No doubt they used this time of gathering for prayer, but they also utilized it for preaching about Jesus of Nazareth whose crucifixion and resurrection is the once-for-all final sacrifice that fulfills all the others at the temple, making the rest unnecessary, obsolete.

But on this particular day St. Luke records a specific example of the truth that "many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles." As Peter and John went up to the temple they found a man who had been lame from birth, who was regularly brought to the temple area in order to beg for alms. But this day they did not give the man any monetary charity, but instead through Peter a miracle was worked, giving him an instantaneous healing that was so complete that, not only did he not need any physical therapy, he didn't even need to learn how to use his healed legs, but was immediately able to walk and even leap as the book of Acts records.³

So the first thing our text would teach us is why a miracle? First, it reveals God's mercy as He alleviates this man's suffering. Truly, seeing God's mercy in action like this reminds us to love our neighbor and to carry out acts of charity and to support mercy work in order to show God's love by helping to alleviate people's suffering as we are able. The second reason for a miracle is "wow factor" that draws people's attention, which it did as we hear "all the people ran to them...astounded." Yet, we quickly realize that this getting people's interest is so that they are present to hear the Word of God, a Word that the miracle helps confirm to be true. And so it was that the people who had gathered to see an amazing miracle then had proclaimed to them a far more amazing truth: that God offered the forgiveness of sins to those who had killed Jesus!

Who was this Jesus? He was—or better, is—God Himself, the only-begotten Son of the Father who had become true man to be the Messiah (Christ), their Savior. This is the Jesus who healed people in their body and minds, who cast out demons who tormented them, who even raised the dead. This is the Jesus who did these miracles, yes, because He had mercy on people, but especially to draw people to Him to hear His preaching and teaching, and to confirm it as true. His preaching and teaching that was centered on God's love and mercy towards sinners, proclaiming forgiveness of sins to all who repent and turn to Him in faith, even "the worst," such as traitorous, thieving tax collectors, prostitutes, adulteresses, and others. This is the Jesus who did everything right, certainly then doing nothing to deserve death, as even the pagan Gentile Roman governor, Pontius Pilate knew for he wanted to release Him.

Yet we know what happened. The leaders were jealous of Jesus' popularity with the people, resented His rebukes against their pride and hypocrisy, and so feared to lose their positions of

authority and the benefits that such gave. So they, rather early one, decided Jesus had to go. But what of the people? Again, you know what happened. On Palm Sunday they hailed Him as the King of Israel, the Christ, but then just a few days later, following their leaders, they cried out "Crucify Him!" They even chose to have Barabbas, a violent criminal who did them no good, released in place of this very Jesus who had done them so much good. So Peter minces no words, "You killed the Author of life."

Can you imagine a worse sin? Even Adam and Eve's foolish decision to disobey God in order to become like Him, as obviously wicked as it was, pales in comparison to crucifying the Son of God by whom all things were made, in whom all things hold together! If all sinners deserve hell, how much more so then these people. So we then hear Peter proclaim God's curse of eternal condemnation upon them, right? Well, not exactly. "Repent therefore, and turn back, that your sins may be blotted out." No doubt they were as surprised to hear that promise as much as you and I are surprised that they would hear it. Yet that, dear Christians, is the Gospel. The promise to them, to you and me, yes, to all people, that all our sins, even the most horrific ones, are forgiven, for the grace and mercy of God is greater than any sin, for they are blotted out completely by the blood of the crucified and risen Jesus, the incarnate Son of God!

Of course, repentance is necessary. One cannot be forgiven their sins if they do not truly grieve over them and refuse to confess them as the vile rebellion they are. And certainly refusing to turn from sin, but instead continuing in it, proves that any "confession" is a complete sham by which they hypocritically try to hide their total rejection of Christ and the forgiveness of sins His sacrifice won. Such people mock God's grace and blasphemes Jesus. The one who refuses to repent as expressed by willingly continuing in sin without grief and struggle, will not inherit the kingdom of God. And none of this is downplaying or denying what Peter proclaimed to the people for the same Peter who promised forgiveness to those who killed Jesus also wrote,

For if, after they have escaped the defilements of the world through the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, they are again entangled in them and overcome, the last state has become worse for them than the first.⁹

Consider also John, who was with Peter and preached the same glorious Gospel of forgiveness, is the same man that wrote what we heard in today's Epistle, "No one who abides in [Jesus] keeps on sinning; no one who keeps on sinning has either seen him or known him." To have faith is to know Jesus as God, Lord, Savior, and Friend. That faith cannot coexist in a heart that does not repent, whether of self-righteousness, the filthiest sin of the flesh, or any other sin.

And that is where Peter's words are important, when he proclaimed that the people and even their rulers acted in *ignorance*.¹¹ That is, ignorant that Jesus really is God's Son and the Savior since He wasn't what they expected or, sadly, wanted. This does not mean that they were not accountable for this sin, as the legal principle states, "Ignorance of the law is no excuse." Hence why Peter doesn't say, "You didn't know so don't worry about it" but instead says, "Repent." You only need to repent for that which you are responsible, so clearly their ignorance did not clear them of the sin.

Yet, there is a difference between sinning in ignorance and in knowledge of the evil. This is true even under imperfect human justice, where leniency is more likely shown the one who did not know that they were doing wrong, or at least the fullness of such. It is also true under divine justice, where the degree of eternal punishment varies accordingly. But even more, and the main point here, the ignorant heart is not hardened yet, the conscience can still be pricked, the soul remains more open to the Law's condemnation and threats, and so repentance before judgment is more likely. But when the sin is known and understood, when it is not ignorance, but evil, it is not the same. St. Augustine's warning is very true, "Sinning because of pleasure is more serious than sinning out of necessity." Yes, both are sins for which the sinner is accountable, but the state of the heart is very different in the two cases as is, or at least should be, obvious.

Once the resurrection was proclaimed to the people, the proof of whom Jesus was removed their ignorance. Now they either repented or they continued in sin with knowledge and so hardened their heart. So too you know God's Law. And knowledge of the Law has removed your ignorance of what sin is. To continue in sin, whether it be idolatry, sexual immorality, greed, or a hypocritical heart that self-righteously refuses to forgive another, is to harden your heart and lose Christ, forgiveness, and salvation. So repent. And keep on repenting, for we daily sin much and we must be sure that no sin takes control of our soul, that is, our heart and mind.

But know something more as well. It is true that not every sin is equal. Yes, all condemn, but there are difference as we heard. This is true. But then it might then seem that some sins are too big to forgive, too sick to be blotted out. No doubt you've heard a voice telling you that about a sin or sins you have committed. Truly, all sincere Christians have heard that voice for they are the ones who actually take their sins seriously! But don't let that voice overwhelm you or fill you with despair. For that is the voice of none other than the Father of *Lies*.

Today's text is the assurance that the truth is quite different, that there is no sin too great that the blood of God cannot blot it out. Scripture is full of this truth. God forgave Adam and Eve who rebelled in Paradise, David who committed both murder and adultery, the adulterous woman, Peter who denied Him to save himself, Paul who brutally persecuted Christians, and these people who killed Jesus. This is because Jesus didn't stay dead, but rose on the third day.

And because Jesus is risen, God forgives you too, and brings you times of refreshing, that is, peace with God and all the blessings of His grace, until the Lord Jesus returns from heaven and restores all things. On that Day, our bodies will be raised in glory, all weakness and disease forever removed, of which the healing of the lame man was a hint, a foretaste.

Dear Christians, Jesus is God's answer to sin. His death and resurrection are the blotting out of sin, yours, mine, everyone's. It is received by all who repent and believe, as is eternal life with Him. And that greatest of miracles is one in which we'll all share! Amen!
