

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


Augsburg Confession Chief Articles of Faith Article III The Son of God

> Our churches teach that the Word, that is, the Son of God, assumed the human nature in the womb of the Blessed Virgin Mary. So there are two natures—the divine and the human inseparably joined in one person. There is one Christ, true God and true man, who was born of the Virgin Mary, truly suffered, was crucified, died, and was buried. He did this to reconcile the Father to us and to be a sacrifice, not only for original guilt, but also for all actual sins of mankind.

He also descended into hell, and truly rose again on the third day. Afterward, He ascended into heaven to sit at the right hand of the Father. There He forever reigns and has dominion over all creatures. He sanctifies those who believe in Him, by sending the Holy Spirit into their hearts to rule, comfort, and make them alive. He defends them against the devil and the power of sin. The same Christ will openly come again to judge the living and the dead, and so forth, according to the Apostles' Creed.



Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost September 8, 2024 Text: James 2:1-10, 14-18 (Epistle) Other Texts: Isaiah 35:4-7a (Old Testament); Mark 7:31-37 (Gospel)

"Faith and Works"

Grace, mercy and peace be yours from God our Father through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ.

"So also faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead."ⁱ These words of St. James as well as their whole surrounding context have caused quite a stir throughout the centuries within the Church of Christ. For there is a tension between St. Paul who writes, "We hold that one is justified by faith apart from works of the law,"ⁱⁱ and James who writes, "You see that a person is justified by works and not by faith alone."ⁱⁱⁱ As some of us may be aware, even the blessed Reformer, Dr. Martin Luther, had a very hard time with the book of James, questioning whether it should even be included in the canon of the Bible. While he definitely softened his "epistle of straw" statement over the years, he always believed that James did not have the true apostolic spirit; that he tried to bring forth holy lives by the Law when it can be done only by the Gospel.

It is necessary to consider the historical context of Luther's opinion, most significantly how the papal party was using James' letter to support their legalism and their soul-destroying heresy of salvation by faith *and* works. Yet, if we are to be faithful first and foremost to God and His Word (which is a requirement of Confessional Lutheranism!), then we must ultimately say that Luther's stance on the book of James *was wrong*.

Fortunately, by God's grace, in his overall teaching, preaching, and writing, Luther did faithfully promote what the book of James *actually* teaches. Unfortunately, there are some Lutherans past and present who follow Luther's error on James and thereby claim to be *better* Lutherans, when in reality they are antinomians, that is, those who oppose the holy law of God and sanctification in the life of believers.

These errorists declare us to be utterly sinful (of itself true), but then go on saying that there's really no reason to fight against sin and grow in good works since you really can't or, at best, the Holy Spirit will just work in you without any conscious thinking, almost by magic. And if you actually consciously try, then you are *rejecting* salvation by faith for one of works! (Interestingly, Luther actually opposed the antinomians, directly writing against them!^{iv})

On the flip side though, there are those Lutherans, both past and present, who are of a strong pietistic bend. They are so heavy on "faith without works is dead," that they themselves become legalists. For while they officially teach that one is saved by faith alone without works, in practicality they replace the biblical definition of saving faith, "trust in God's grace Christ crucified alone for the forgiveness of sins," with something more like "a converted heart and regenerated life that is actively serving the Lord God in holy works."

While that sound pious, see how trust in Christ's work and sacrifice is replaced with trust in one's own works and changed lives. To be blunt, there's very little difference between such

"Lutheranism" and Roman Catholicism, except that the Pope of Rome is replaced by the pope of one's own heart! For make no mistake, pietistic Lutherans, like all legalists, judge between works not so much on the basis of God's Law, but on what I do, which is then truly holy, and what I don't do which, clearly, is not so necessary. No wonder such people are often hypocritical judges, since if you're not doing what I think is necessary, you're just not a *real* Christian! Truly, it is to such hypocrites as these that Jesus says, "Judge not, that you be not judged."

So how then are we to understand James without thinking that he contradicts Paul (or viceversa), especially since we know that the Holy Spirit cannot contradict Himself! Before going further, let us be absolutely clear about a fundamental truth. If faith without works, that is, *without good and holy works of love and mercy in accordance with God's Law*, if *that* faith is dead, then obviously any "faith" that continues in conscious, willful, impenitent sin and evil works is nothing less than an abomination before the Holy God. People living according to the sinful nature, who are following the thoughts and ways of the sinful world, should not boast of their faith as they cannot even claim to be a Christian. The only thing that can be said to someone with such a "faith" is, "Those who do such things will not inherit the kingdom of God."^{vi}

With that said, we must, grow in our knowledge of Scripture so we can *believe rightly*. And that, dear Christians, is exactly what James is helping us do. He is further defining *the faith in Christ that alone saves*. He asks, "What good is it, my brothers, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him?"^{vii} In other words, is *that kind of faith*, which does not have works of love and mercy in accordance with the Law, actually saving faith? And clearly the answer given by James, as well as Paul and all of Scripture, is a resounding "No!"

It is not that faith *plus* works saves. It is, however, the faith that saves *also produces good works*, being active in love as St. Paul says.^{viii} Therefore, James is not so much contrasting faith and works, but a dead faith which merely gives some sort of intellectual acknowledgment of God, that which even the demons have,^{ix} and a living faith in the risen, that is, very alive, Lord Jesus that is so filled with thanksgiving towards God and love for Him and His salvation that it simply must love others whom God created and for whom Christ died. The one forgiven all sins through faith in Christ is also, *through that same faith*, being made into an increasingly healthy and good tree by His Spirit. *That saving faith* produces healthy and good fruit because a Christian's soul, their heart, mind, and will, are renewed in the image of Christ. If we have true faith, saving faith, then we truly desire to do the good works that the Law demands.

Fellow redeemed, do not let Satan confuse you. Christ Jesus alone is our redeemer, reconciler, mediator, justifier, and savior. He has done all that is necessary to save us, nothing at all is lacking! You do not, in any way, need to complete Jesus' perfect life and sacrifice for you! To think you do is a satanic lie that robs Christ of His glory and your conscience of the certainty of salvation. He said, "It is finished!" *not* "I did my work, now you do yours!"

Yet, while in no way necessary for salvation, our works are good, proper and, yes, even necessary *in their own place*. Just because our works do not serve the purpose of saving us does not mean that they do not have their own holy and righteous purposes, which they surely do!

First, and this should be obvious, they are the obedience commanded and required by God, what we creatures owe our creator. As mentioned earlier, our works are a thank offering to the goodness of God, an important and necessary aspect of our spiritual worship as we offer ourselves as living sacrifices that are acceptable to our God and Savior.^x Second, others are served, their lives improved, their sorrows softened, by our works of love, charity, and mercy.

Third, through our holy lives and good works our Heavenly Father is glorified through us. As the Lord Jesus says, "In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."^{xi}

Fourth, and related to what I just said, our good works are a witness of our faith to others, as James said, "I will show you my faith by my works."^{xii} Believers are built up, inspired, encouraged and, potentially, even corrected by our good works. And unbelievers are given a genuine example of Christianity, not by softening doctrine, not because we condone their sin in any way, but because we love sinners with the same love that Christ has for us (and for them!).

Fifth, while good works are neither necessary to be saved nor to keep faith alive, for that would mean works are still necessary to save us, that in no way denies their value to our faith. Quite evidently, to choose not do good works is harmful to faith, for those are sins of omission, that is, choosing to omit the good that God commands us to do.^{xiii} But even more, God in His grace trains, exercises, and enhances our faith both through the cross He puts on us and by our doing the good works He has prepared for us to do from eternity.^{xiv}

Sixth, while the greatest confidence of our faith is grounded in Holy Baptism where the Holy Spirit birthed us from above through water and the Word,^{xv} still we know that saving faith is a living faith and a living faith does good works. So as we serve the Lord by serving others, as we benefit them with our works of love, we are also being assured that our faith is not false and dead, but true and living. As St. Peter writes, "Therefore, brothers, be all the more diligent to confirm your calling and election, for if you practice these qualities you will never fall."^{xvi}

Finally (*and this is amazing indeed*), God so desires our good works that He actually promises to reward them. Of course, He does not have to; we were created to do good works, anything less is our fault. Yet, as a loving Father, purely out of grace, He permits them to earn blessings of both body and soul for both this life on earth and the life to come in eternity.^{xvii}

Dear Christians, it has been well-said, "Faith alone saves, but the faith that saves is never alone." Faith without good works is no faith at all. But equally true, good works without faith in Christ are no good works at all, for one must already be a good tree through faith to produce the fruit of *good* works.^{xviii} These two things, believing in Christ alone for our salvation *and* diligently growing in the good works that saving faith produces, must be proclaimed for as long as we live here on earth. Those who will not turn from sin, improve their lives and grow in good works must know that they do not, *cannot*, have saving faith. But equally true, those who do these things are thereby *giving external evidence of their internal saving faith in Christ Jesus*.

God grant us a faith in Christ, proven to be alive by the abundance of good works it brings forth! Amen!
